A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

I find it interesting that the Israelite community was complaining in the first reading, wishing they were still back in Egypt.

Why is it interesting? Because they were slaves in Egypt. Why would they complain about their current situation, where they are totally and completely free, and want to abandon it to go back and become slaves again? Why did they long for their former condition? It says they longed for their former condition, the condition of slavery, because while they were slaves they were provided food.

I ask you. What would you prefer? Would you rather be a slave, where food and shelter is provided for you, or be totally free and self-controlled but have to fend for yourself in regards to finding food and shelter?

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What would you rather have?

We certainly like and enjoy our freedom, but we also like to eat. Have you ever not eaten for a couple days? It is very difficult. It is hard enough to drive a person to wish they had a slave master who would be willing to give them food and shelter. That is what the people of Israel were struggling with and why they were longing for their former enslaved condition where "we say by our fleshpots and ate our fill of bread!"

So what do you want? How much freedom and independence are you willing to give up in order to attain a certain level of stable food and shelter?

This plays out in many peoples' lives in regards to the political parties with whom they align themselves. Some are attracted by the idea of freedom and personal autonomy and independence. Some drawn to the idea of have a 'master' who will provide and care for them. Much of what people argue about, politically, is the amount of freedom and independence they are willing to sacrifice in order to be cared for.

So what does God think? Where does God fall in regards to the idea of freedom/independence vs authority/governance? To get the answer all we have to do is continue reading the first reading and it gives us two principles that define God's stance on the matter.

First, it should be obvious God loves independence and self-governance. . He hates slavery. How do we know that? Because He is the one who led them out of the desert. He knew they were going to need food (remember He made us). Nevertheless, He did not want them in that condition of slavery, even if they were being cared for to a certain degree.

Second, He wants that people LOOK TO HIM to be the one to whom they sacrifice their freedom and autonomy in order to be provided a measure of stable care and provision. You should not sacrifice your freedom and autonomy to anyone or anything, no matter how good the deal is. You should only make that sacrifice to God. Because to whom you sacrifice your freedom and autonomy, you make your God. To whom you entrust yourself to be cared for, you make Lord. And there is only one God to whom, when you do sacrifice your freedom and autonomy. He is absolutely perfect in what He will do with that sacrifice and will make sure that it comes back to you 10 fold (as the New Testament says).
